
Dear friends,

We approach the season of Lent which is a classic time for self examination in the church year. It is based on Jesus period of fasting and temptation in the wilderness before he embarked on his 🤿 public ministry. The prevailing image is one of retreat from our day to day distractions to take stock of direction of our lives. In popular culture, the season is where Christians "give things up" for the good of their individual souls.



This is all well and good, but the danger of such a strategy is

that we all disappear into a puff of self absorption. It is easy in Lent to become so inward looking that we forget that Christ calls us to other people in mission and service. It is better in Lent to look outwards with a discerning eye and to see the world as it really is.



For Christians who are persecuted around the world, faith in Christ leads to great suffering and pain. We tend to use words such as discipleship and commitment very lightly in our secure society.

retreat from these things often out of

apathy or because we have something better But for many Christians, discipleship may mean imprisonment or even death. In that context the images and metaphors of Christian faith (such as carrying one's cross) become more vibrant and real.



We could also look at our faith from the perspective of the poor. When Jesus says "Blessed are the poor" we in the rich world tend to view his pronouncement as being rather quaint. But for those who have nothing, in our own land or overseas, Jesus words are electrifying. It is a

joyful proclamation for these "little ones" who will be first in the kingdom of God. We tend to view ourselves as people who give to the poor, but what we often fail to appreciate is that the poor have much to give us. We can learn much about the evil in our world that exploits the poor and about the kind of faith which endures come what may.

In all of this there is a curious kind of freedom to be found in getting 'me and my problems' off my mind. Faith is always the kind of journey that is best undertaken in the company of others. Kathy Galloway of the Iona community put it very well when she wrote a Lenten hymn. The last verse goes like this:

Do not retreat into your private world, There are more ways than firesides to keep warm; There is no shelter from the rage of life, So meet its eye, and dance within the storm.

Lent is a good time to open our eyes and look outwards examining the ways in which other people live and the problems they must face. As we do this then so we grapple with the real nature of the kingdom of God and ask questions of our own faith. We might



also ask what is the work that Christ is calling us to do?

Before you knew me



A short time ago, we welcomed two new local preachers into the circuit - Alison and Peter Brophy. Alison tells us more about her life before we had the pleasure of knowing her.

You were born in Birkenhead where your family owned a removal business and you've moved house many times.

Are the two connected by any chance?

Not at all. We <u>have</u> moved several times but it has been work-related rather than genetic predisposition! Our first professional jobs were at Lancaster University library which is where we met. Our next move was to Scotland and then to Middlesbrough where our daughter was born. From Middlesbrough we moved to Bradford-on-Avon in Wiltshire and then back to Lancaster where we stayed for the next 26 years before finally (we hope!) settling in Romanby.

Do you have a Methodist background?

Yes. I was fortunate to grow up in a Methodist church which loved and valued its children and young people and was part of a large and flourishing youth fellowship where we were encouraged to take part in planning and leading worship.

Perhaps this was instrumental in you becoming a local preacher?

I'm sure it was. I was accepted on note in my home circuit in Birkenhead, became fully accredited in Middlesbrough and have just completed forty years on full plan.

You must have worshipped and preached at a wide variety of churches during that time?

Our moves around the country have certainly given us a varied experience of Methodism, from a one church, one minister circuit in Scotland to a largely rural, farming circuit in Lancaster via a city centre church in Middlesbrough and a united Methodist/URC area in Wiltshire.

You are a librarian by profession. Did you study locally? Yes, at Liverpool library school.

You have been involved in Methodism connexionally, I think. How?

While in Lancaster I trained as a counsellor and that led to my being The Methodist Church appointed by the Connexion as an in Britain assessor for candidates for the ministry which I found daunting but fascinating. For six years I was part of the Magnet editorial team and that was a wonderful experience, working with a talented and creative group of women and gaining an insight into the work of the Methodist Church at Connexional level

Perhaps now you have time for more leisure interests?

Peter and I have both camped all our lives but about six years ago we surrendered to increasing age and did something which we had always said we would never do and bought our first caravan. This was a revelation as unlike our tent it came with a loo and central heating and since then we have spent quite a few weeks each year exploring the UK, towing our home from home behind us. We enjoy visiting museums, galleries and historic sites and are keen theatre-goers and gardeners. As befits two librarians we also have a penchant for acquiring rather more books than we have room for but are still incapable of walking past a bookshop. My main interest is patchwork and quilting and since moving to Romanby I have joined the Mowbray Quilters and am enjoying getting to know the fabric shops of North Yorkshire, adding to my stash being another weakness.

Yorkshire to Gambia Educational Trust

In November last year the CAMEO group at Northallerton Methodist Church invited Marion Casson to speak to them at one of their meetings.

Set SHIRE TO GAN After hearing about the work we decided that this was something that Coffee Pot would like to make a donation to, as part of our annual charitable giving.



The Gambia is one of Africa's smallest countries. Education is highly valued but must be paid for by parents. This is a challenge real to most families, but despite this

almost 93% of the nation's children attend school.

The Trust is a charitable organisation working in The Gambia since 2011, providing training workshops for teachers.

The team is made up of experienced educational professionals from Yorkshire. They visit The Gambia every year to run courses which support the work of Gambian teachers from both primary and secondary schools. The courses provide additional teaching methods, techniques and supplies for Gambian teachers who are dedicated but often have to teach with limited resources.

The Yorkshire team works on a voluntary basis and fundraises for charity with the a variety of events throughout the year.

The Trust works in partnership with the Gambian Teachers Union (GTU) which is integral to the work done by the charity.. The GTU is an independent Gambian organisation that supports and monitors teaching and learning within the country.




Whilst most of the focus has been on people and training, the Trust is now involved in improving facilities in schools and providing them with equipment that they can use to generate income. They are working

closely with Bundung Lower

Basic School. A well and hand pump were installed with the sponsorship of Ice Renewables, a UK based energy company, resulting in 2000 pupils having access to free, safe drinking water for the first time.

A wood saving stove was also installed to help the school save money on wood and reduce harmful soot and smoke in the school


their wardrobes, but they all contributed to the atmosphere of fun. We didn't lose sight of the Bible story though with its message of family division being healed in the end by love.




On 4th February Romanby Methodist church was the venue for
